She was hand picked by the President to be the first civilian passenger into space, and she was a teacher, a mother and a spouse. This program, using nothing but broadcasts from television and radio (with a small use of text), introduces the woman as all the things mentioned above and really puts things into perspective for people like myself who know of the Challenger disaster, but who never truly understood the scope of how truly tragic it was. I highly recommend this program to anyone. It does an amazing job of telling the story with a narration put together from the past. Enjoy.
